"Los sentimientos de inferioridad" (the feelings of inferiority) by E. Lossart, Boletín de Educacion, Argentina, 1939, No. 26, pp. 19-21.

After showing how the sciences of education and psychiatry have been enriched by Alfred Adler's discovery of the importance of the inferiority feelings, the author gives a brief account of the main concepts of Individual Psychology.
